Open and Affirming Celebration and Seeking Spirit Sunday July 14th

14th We will have three big events on Sunday, July 14th. We will celebrate our standing in the national church as a certified Open and Affirming Congregation during the service and refreshments (a Susan Hodges rainbow cake!). The 14th is also our next Seeking Spirit Sunday. It will feature guest speaker Wendy Teller-Elsberg whose talk is entitled, “The Need to Be Known as Ourselves: How parenting a non-binary child taught me we all have a gender identity.” Wendy will help us reflect on gender and misgendering. Then after celebratory refreshments we will have the third event of the 14th: **an important circle conversation** for the whole congregation about the future world we foresee and the role of the church within it. Important Conversation on July 14th after Refreshments The Church Council invites you to a conversation on July 14th about the world we foresee 25 years from now and the role of the church within it. The Council has been discussing launching a planning process, and this conversation will allow the congregation to participate in the **pre-planning** discussion. Our goals are to get a sense of the importance of planning at this time, and the scope of planning we may need. We will ask four questions: 1. Given the way things are going today, what do you think our society and world will look like in 25 years socially, environmentally, economically, culturally, politically or any other way? 2. What kind of support will the people of that time need, either of a kind that a church traditionally has offered or support that goes beyond past practices? 3. If there is a spiritual community in Strafford serving the people of that time, what would that spiritual community ideally be and do? 4. Churches, like most institutions, go through life cycles of rising anew, reaching a plateau and then descending. Different kinds of planning are appropriate at each stage. Where would you say we are in our lifecycle now? The meeting will end at or before 1:30 PM. Please speak with Tom if you have questions.

Election 2024: What Is at Stake? A Talk on Constitutional Democracy and the Rule of Law Here on Monday, June 24th at 7:00 PM

The policy positions of the two principal presidential candidates, and more broadly, the two principal political parties, span a wide variety of issues, foreign and domestic.

As the November election approaches, we will hear competing positions on issues such as social equity, the economy, social security, tax policy, climate and the environment, immigration, women’s reproductive rights, gender identity, and other LGBTQ+ matters and foreign policy, among others.

Cutting across all these specific topics, however, are larger themes conjuring two different visions of what it means to live in a “constitutional democracy” respecting the “rule of law.”

Presidents wield great power and influence, to be sure. Yet that power and influence is divided and checked at the federal level by the Senate, the House of Representatives, and the Supreme Court. It is also shared in our federal system with the powers allocated to state and local governments, and to lower state and federal courts.

The two presidential candidates, and their respective parties, are animated by quite different notions concerning the proper distribution of powers among the various institutions that comprise our constitutional democracy. They also embrace differing views of what it means to live in a society that respects the rule of law. It is no exaggeration to characterize the contrasts as embracing starkly different visions of the fundamental character of the nation.

Rod Smolla, President of the Vermont Law and Graduate School and a lifelong constitutional law scholar, teacher, and litigator, will seek to articulate, objectively and fairly, these contrasting visions, and then lead an open discussion with attendees on the issues posed.

Why Have an Election Speaker Series in Our Church? Our Fulfilling Our Vision committee looks for ways to fulfill our Future Directions Vision which says in part: “We want to be a **center for questioning and discussing**.... We hope to **consider seemingly insurmountable world problems** [and find a path to action].... We want to **create a safe forum** where we can consider big questions and controversial issues..., where we can disagree and still get along.” We feel the choices we make in this election will shape our future and are extremely important to discuss. By IRS rules, a church cannot endorse or oppose any candidate, directly or indirectly, but it can offer education on issues that will be affected by an election. Our speaker series is designed to do that, entitled “Election 2024: What Is at Stake?” Our two goals are: 1) to educate people about what is at stake in the election in a variety of issue areas; and, 2) to inspire people to become active and devote time and resources to help elect candidates who are more aligned with the nation and world they want to create, whoever those candidates may be. We will ask each speaker to make clear the difference between the two major parties and their candidates on one particular issue or set of issues. We hope people will come away with a good overview and specific examples of the starkly contrasting worlds the two different approaches to the issue would create.

Upcoming Speakers on “Election 2024: What Is at Stake?”

The speaker series that begins on Monday, June 24th with Rod Smolla’s presentation on “Democracy and the Rule of Law” will continue with at least three other presentations on: climate and the environment; domestic economic issues including social equity, taxes and social security; and individual rights including reproductive rights and rights of BIPOC and LGBTQ+ people. The Rev. Jim Antal will speak on climate and the environment on Wednesday, July 24th at 7:00 PM. We will announce other dates shortly. Please spread the word about these events!
